Acknowledgements

In researching the history of the Association I have been very fortunate to receive a lot of assistance from Betty Knight the daughter of Andrew Shankland Knight who was the Secretary of the Association from 1932 to 1941. The guidance of Bob Chalmers from the Essendon Historical Society is also gratefully acknowledged. It was Bob who put me on the track of a lot of the early history of the Association and the early editions of the Essendon Gazette have been a most useful resource. The early research of Aub Giddings and Don McCabe is also gratefully acknowledged. Early Minute Books from 1941-42 and 1947–1965 were valuable resources and also some old copies of Annual Reports. The late Mrs Verna Littlejohn supplied me with a quantity of photos and memorabilia of her husband Alf. Copies of the photos have been passed on to the Jika CA and the MMVCA where applicable. Alf was a life member of the Campbellfield CC and had played for several clubs in the 1930's including Merlynston, Clifton (or possibly Clifton Brick CC) and Northern Colts Cricket Club, Fawkner. Cricket has been played in Australia possibly from 1830 and the Melbourne Cricket Club was formed in 1838. Essendon CC first played under its own name in 1872/73, which was a reforming of the old, Essendon and Flemington CC. Essendon however did not play in any organised competition until 1886/87 when they joined the VCA. The Protestant Churches had an extremely strong competition in the Flemington and Essendon area from 1902 and most churches had at least one team in the competition. There were other cricket associations in the area such as Church of Christ Association, Church of England Cricket Association, Essendon Scottish Cricket Association, and the North Suburban Cricket Association. Most government departments and factories, large industrial and commercial operations had a cricket team and played regular social matches. Cricket was played at Campbellfield, Bulla and Wildwood as early as 1874 and Aub Giddings says in his notes that he was shown, by a Mr Jim Hume of Glenroy, a copy of a photo and scorebook from a match between Campbellfield and Wildwood from this era. Mrs Verna Littleiohn, just before her unfortunate demise in February 2002. showed to me an original postcard dated February 26th 1894 written by the Secretary, Mr Edward Swan, of the Campbellfield CC to Mr A F Daniel the Secretary of the Bulla CC. The card says,

"Dear Sir, I am sorry to say that I am unable to get a team to meet you next Saturday. There are only about four of us available, which would be useless to meet such a team as yours. Hoping this will not put you to any great inconvenience."

A photocopy of this card is held by the Association and is reproduced on Page ???? The Association has a scorebook of a cricket match played between Campbellfield and Riverside CC on 4th February 1922 and Glenroy CC on 4th March 1922.

The Cricketer's Prayer

Lord give me strength to hit a six So high that even I When speaking of it to my friends may never have to lie

The Association possibly had its beginnings in 1923 (or it may even have been earlier) when in the area known as Essendon, six teams agreed to play social cricket matches whenever possible. This was not a fully structured or regulated Association, as we know it today.

I have however not been able to obtain details of which teams competed or to find any definite proof of this actually occurring except for the early hand written notes from the late Aub Giddings. A Secretary of this early group was shown in these notes as a Mr B Sullivan. In an article written by a stalwart of the Association, Frank McDonough, and published in the "Broadmeadows Observer" dated 10th October 1973 it mentions in an interview with George Luscombe that he was one of the original members who formed this social group. I have to therefore assume that the Association did have its beginnings in 1923 however my research has highlighted several discrepancies in this article by Frank McDonough and it cannot be assumed that everything mentioned there is 100% correct.

These six teams held their meetings at "Kirks Bazaar" which was in Keilor Road, North Essendon near the intersection of Bulla, Keilor and Mt Alexander Roads on the north-eastern side on the road and on the site currently occupied by a "BI-LO" or "Coles" Supermarket. Kirks Bazaar was an extremely popular venue for the purchase and sale of various types of household goods, both new and second-hand, and livestock, which was mainly poultry. Motor vehicles of all types were auctioned, as were houses and land. Auctions were held regularly and many a bargain was to be had. "Kirks" was run by Mr Harry Kirk the eldest son of John Kirk the founder of the famous "Kirks Horse Bazaar" of Bourke Street, Melbourne.

The reason for choosing this venue would have been because of its size and also the regular meetings of the North Essendon and South Broadmeadows Progress Associations were held here.

It is assumed therefore from these early notes that the six teams may have been Essendon Diggers, Moonee Valley, Sydenham, Glenroy, Aberfeldie??????

In early October 1928 a meeting was held at Kirks Bazaar between the local Progress Associations and it was decided to form a cricket association comprising of teams representing Progress Associations in Essendon and the surrounding district.

The 7 teams were, with the delegate's names in brackets:

North Essendon (L. A. Enderby & G Waghorn) Aberfeldie (Smith & Trengrove) Keilor Road & South Broadmeadows (Harrison & Muir Brown & G Cranwell) Sydenham (Luscombe & Excell) St Albans (Trudgen & McKenzie) Glenroy (Houston & Admans) West Coburg (Lee & Acocks)

The name of this Association was called "**The Northern District Progress Cricket Association**"

President Mr G Cranwell Secretary G F Acocks

In a match on 27th October 1928 it was reported that E Beames playing for West Coburg v North Essendon "sent the bails spinning 39yds". Beames finished the innings with the figures of 4/28.

Premiers for season 1928-29, which was played at Glenroy over 3 Saturdays because of poor light and concluded on 4th May 1929, were **Keilor Road & Districts who defeated Aberfeldie**.

Scores **Keilor Road 91** (Butterley 16, Clarke 15, O'Neill 13, Enderby 10 no Johns 3/16, Grieves 3/23 & Milne 3/32) **and 90** (Butterley 20, Forster 30 Johns 3/20 & Grieves 3/26) defeated **Aberfeldie 71** (F K Smith 21, Milne 13, O'Neill 7/26 & Swann 2/13) **and 38** (Milne 15, Hansen 1/8, Swann 2/13 & O'Neill 7/16).

The Premiership Shield, which was supplied by Hartley's Sports Store of Melbourne and called the Hartley Shield, was presented together with other trophies by Mr G Cranwell (President) at a euchre party and dance held at the Rose Street Hall Essendon on Saturday 18th May 1929.

In is interesting to note that the Secretary/Treasurer of Keilor Road was plainclothes Constable S McD Millar who was stationed at Flemington Police Station. In January 1931 he transferred to Benalla.

Season 1929-30

In September 1929 the Northern Districts Progress Cricket Association decided to engage professional umpires to officiate in matches for the 1929-30 season and advertised in the "Essendon Gazette" for personnel with previous umpiring experience.

North Essendon CC (President F Crownell & Secretary Harrison) announced at their Annual awards night that the following were trophy winners: F Warner batting average, R Adams bowling average 42 wickets @ 6.7, W Boquest best all rounder & L Wright best fielder.

Premiers for season 1929-30 which was played at Glenroy were Aberfeldie who defeated Keilor Road & District.

Both George Luscombe and Andrew Shankland Knight were by this time playing for Sydenham during this season

The Semi-Finals were between West Coburg v Sydenham. North Essendon v Aberfeldie.

North Essendon 88 & 9/77 lost to Aberfeldie 99 &7/71

Premiers for season 1930-31 were Aberfeldie who defeated West Coburg by 86 runs.

Season 1931-32

Ten clubs competed in the competition this season

Aberfeldie, Keilor, Keilor Road, Moonee Ponds Traders, Moonee Valley, North Essendon, Napier Park, Pascoe Vale, Sydenham, West Coburg.

In August 1931 the Moonee Ponds Traders Association formed a cricket team to compete in the Northern Districts Progress Cricket Association and was known as the Moonee Ponds Traders Cricket Club or Traders. Their President was Cr W B Reid, Secretary Mr E Rixon and Treasurer Mr D Nunan. The club charged its members 3/- per player membership fee.

The Semi-Finals were between

Moonee Ponds Traders v Pascoe Vale. Aberfeldie v West Coburg.

The Moonee Ponds Traders, who were in their first season in the Association, selected their team for the Semi final from the following players, Adams, Cairns, Picken, (or Pickin), Ashworth, Baker, Black, O'Connor, Faust, Sully, Willett, Jude, Rixon, Tissot & Cahir.

The semi-final between Moonee Ponds Traders and Pascoe Vale was required to be played on the 9th April 1932 on the ground of the Keilor Rd Cricket Club Cnr Keilor Road and Ogilvie Street, Essendon just past the then Essendon Tram Terminus, which ended at Birdwood Avenue. The match however could not take place as specified because of very heavy rain and the ground was under water. The match was subsequently re scheduled to the following Saturday 16th April 1932 at Ormond Park.

The scores from this match were **Pascoe Vale 162** (Hammond 33 no, Masters 33, Sheldon 39, Cairns 4/36, Adams 2/44 & Baker 3/40) **d Moonee Ponds Traders 145** (A. A. Sully 70, Adams 17, Cairns 15, Baker 14, Crosby 5/44 & Aiken 3/37).

Scores for the other semi–final Aberfeldie v West Coburg are incomplete but show Aberfeldie all out 256 and West Coburg 4/17 at stumps 1st Day.

Aberfeldie and Pascoe Vale who tied the Final shared the premiership for season 1931-32. I have been unable to locate any details of the scores.

Presentation Night was held on 1st October 1932 at Ascot Vale Masonic Hall with 140 people in attendance. Wally Milne of Aberfeldie CC won both the Batting & Bowling averages. Aberfeldie players from the tied premiership were presented each with a pullover in club colours whilst the Pascoe Vale Club was presented with a cheque of equal value.

The Moonee Ponds Traders CC also conducted at this venue and at this time the presentation of trophies for their players.

For Season 1932-3 nine clubs competed in the competition, which was now called **The North West Cricket Association:**

President Mr G Downs Secretary Mr A Knight

Aberfeldie, East Essendon, Keilor, Keilor Road, Moonee Ponds Traders, Moonee Valley, North Essendon, Napier Park, Pascoe Vale.

Sydenham club disbanded, and a new team was entered from East Essendon. West Coburg was a non-starter possibly because the Coburg District Cricket Association was just formed and West Coburg decided to enter their teams in that competition.

Mr. Andrew Shankland Knight who was by now playing with the Moonee Valley club was appointed Secretary of the Association.

The Association organised a Social match that was extremely well attended by players and their families and was played on the 8th April 1933 (Easter Saturday) against Trentham. The team was

Moonee Valley CC announced their Annual Awards for 1932-33 as follows

In a match Moonee Valley v East Essendon played 26th January 1933 Tom Herbert from Moonee Valley scored 98, which was then, the highest score achieved in the Association. This surpassed the best score of 91 achieved by A Knight also of Moonee Valley.

This record did not last long as two further high scores were recorded, F Nancarrow (Aberfeldie) scored 108 no v Moonee Valley and W Christie (Keilor Rd) scored 105. A youngster called Kenny Chapman (Aberfeldie) scored a very brisk 52 in 20 minutes in the match v Moonee Valley.

In the match Moonee Valley v East Essendon, Moonee Valley surpassed the best team score of 231 set by Aberfeldie.

Scores were as follows:

This record best team score of 232 did not last long as Keilor scored 270 in the following match also against the hapless East Essendon.

A fortnight later Aberfeldie scored 339 against East Essendon.

Premiership for season 1932-33 was won by Aberfeldie d Moonee Ponds Traders by 8 wickets. This match was played over five weeks at Pascoe Vale. Aberfeldie won the Hartley Cup outright after having won three successive premierships.

Aberfeldie went through season undefeated.

A consolation Round, for teams that finished 5th to 8th, was introduced during 1932-33 and was won by Keilor who defeated Keilor Rd.

Season 1933-34

President W Newton Secretary A S Knight Treasurer H Sherburn

The Annual Meeting was held at Kirks Bazaar on 24th August 1933 attended by over 30 delegates from local clubs and elected President Mr W E Newton (well known at Essendon FC), Vice Presidents C Milne & G Luscombe, Secretary Mr Andrew Shankland Knight and Treasurer Mr H Sherburn.

Numerous clubs applied for membership of the Association and the meeting selected Glenbervie, Regals and Swastika to add interest to the forthcoming season, which was scheduled to commence on 30th September 1933.

Twelve clubs now competed in the competition

Aberfeldie, East Essendon, Glenbervie, Keilor, Keilor Road, Moonee Ponds Traders, Moonee Valley, North Essendon, Napier Park, Pascoe Vale, Regals, Swastika.

Glenbervie was based at Cross Keys Reserve with Mr S G Berrill as Secretary and Reg Thompson as Treasurer.

The captain of Moonee Valley was Mr Andrew Knight.

The Annual Presentation Night for the previous season (1932-33) was held on 11th September 1933 in the supper room of the Moonee Ponds Town Hall.

Moonee Ponds Traders CC were presented with a cheque for being Runners-up and Keilor CC, who were winners of the consolation trophy, presented to all their players cricket caps in the colours of the Association, Navy Blue with Gold monograms.

A feature of this Grand Final was a splendid effort by a 15 yo boy A Bass playing for Keilor Rd. In their second innings he opened the batting and carried his bat for 13no, 9 of these runs came in the last 10 minutes of the innings.

Keilor won consolation round for the second consecutive year. Scores

In this Grand Final G Luscombe "who hails from Sydenham", in his opening over in the second innings dismissed Pascoe Vale's first three batsmen for 4 runs.

Trophy winners for the season were: Batting J Kidney (Glenbervie) 42.2 av Bowling B Lindsay (Aberfeldie) 5.2 av Highest individual score J Lewis (Glenbervie) 132 Most wickets R Buckley (Regals) 50 @ 8.3

An interesting match to note was that the Essendon Operatic Society Cricket team played its first ever match – a social fixture – against the Footlighter Society at Cardinia Park Beaconsfield on 25th February 1934. The team comprised L Wynne, L Woods, C Kerville, R Kerville, W Nancarrow, L Jennings, C Daniels, J Kennedy, Hunt, S Grunden, Leo Black and J Davidson. The club later on that year decided to enter a team in the Association.

Another noteworthy event was that in June 1934 Carter Bros CC honoured its Secretary, Mr E W Sleep, with an inscribed gold Life Membership medallion for 10 years outstanding service to the club. Mr W B Carter presented this at a dance and social evening at the Essendon Masonic Hall. Carter Bros were later to enter a side in the Association for season 1936-37.

At the Annual General Meeting on 13th August 1934 at the Essendon Cricket ground pavilion for Season 1934-35 the Association again changed its name again this time to **The Essendon District Cricket Association.** The following office bearers were also elected:

President Mr W E (Bill) Newton of the Essendon Football Club Secretary Mr Andrew Shankland Knight. Treasurer Mr H Sherburn The last two were described as a "Couple of live wires"

In August 1934 the Essendon Operatic and Choral Society formally entered a side in the Association. Mr J Davidson was their Club President, Mr Ron Kerville Secretary and G Hornbuckle Treasurer. The club advertised for new or second-hand matting. The objects of the club are the attainment of cricket free from any objectionable feature, better understanding and good fellowship among members.

After advertising in August 1934 that the Association had vacancies for new teams, the demand was such that a second grade was introduced for the 1934-35 season

It is interesting to note that St John's was a team comprised mainly of former Essendon Grammar School students and they formerly played in the early 1930's in the Essendon & Flemington Protestant Churches Association. The club was promoted to A Grade in the Churches and played as St John's "B". The St John's Presbyterian side, which was a founder club of the Churches competition when it was formed in 1903, was known as St John's "A". St John's "B" finished second in the Churches in 1934-35 and transferred to the E.D.C.A. for Season 1935-36. In 1940 St John's "B" amalgamated with Essendon Operatic.

Essendon Operatic CC appointed Ron Kerville as captain for Season 1935-36 with Cliff Daniels as vice captain. The club reported that they had acquired 5 new players for their first season in A Grade, J Fisher & L Woods from St Johns, W Nancarrow from Essendon, S Westgarth & H Raisbeck from "one of the local church teams". In their first match v Keilor both sides appeared to struggle for runs with the bowlers being dominant. It was reported that some Essendon Operatic players went out in their first innings to several "most spectacular catches" whilst Keilor appealed on the first day unsuccessfully against the light on many occasions but were required by the umpire to continue their innings until stumps.

Les Turner had previously given outstanding service as a bowler to St John's Presbyterian side from 1927 to 1935. He had previously played with South Melbourne CC before World War I, and in the 1940's he returned to the Churches competition to play with North Essendon Methodists.

Scorer's Trophy for best kept score book was a tie between Mrs L Wright of North Essendon who received a mulga wood box and Mr A Thompson of Essendon Operatic Society CC who received a cigarette case. A silver cake dish was presented to Mr H Sherburn who had been the Association Treasurer for four years and who resigned for business reasons.

A further presentation, described as unique in the history of the Association was a silver cake comport with forks attached presented to Mrs A S Knight by members of the Executive in appreciation of the services she has rendered the Association. Mrs Knight was the first person outside the Association to receive a presentation. (Note that this cake comport is now in the possession of the Association having been kindly donated by Betty Knight, the daughter of Andrew Shankland Knight). Special mention was made of Mr A Knight the Association Secretary for being both hard working and efficient.

Mr A Knight who was now playing for the North Essendon CC won that club's fielding trophy, donated by J S Milne.

Mr A Knight now aged 40 won the Essendon ANA CC batting trophy donated by H T Harvey with an average 20.3 and also the bowling trophy donated by A S McDonald with an average of 10.

Mr A Knight won the Association's trophy donated by R Thompson for the most wickets viz 50 in the second grade competition.

On 20th May 1941 the Association held the Annual Trophy Night, which was held at the RSSAILA (Returned Soldiers) Hall in Holmes Road, Moonee Ponds.

A Knight had been runner-up last year, (1939-40 to Hugo from Sydenham) in the "Most Wickets" category with 56 wickets @10.3 av Junior Champion A & B Grades G Lane (Oaklands)

R Cooley had previously been the Junior Champion in 1939-40 and had won the batting trophy with 460 runs at an average of 50.

On May 22nd 1941 Mr Andy Knight Secretary of the E.D.C.A. for the past 10 years resigned. At a social gathering, the president Cr Jolly presented Mr Knight with a "handsome wristlet watch" in appreciation of his services to the Association and to cricket in the district. Cr Jolly said the Association had the good fortune and advantage in having had Mr Knight's interest and efforts for so long and his place would be hard to fill.

Teams entered Ascot Vale, Australian National Airways, Carter Bros A, Carter Bros B, Essendon ANA, Flemington ANA, Keilor, North Essendon, Oaklands, Ormond Amateurs,

Even more clubs were unable to field teams because of the effects of the war. St John's Operatic, Sydenham, St Monica's Australian National Airways B and Pascoe Vale departed however; Flemington ANA were able to field a team.

Mr G Luscombe was cleared on 25th November 1941 from North Essendon to play for Keilor.

Starting time for matches was 2.15pm. Clubs were fined 2/6d for a late start; umpires were fined 1/- for failing to submit a report on match. Umpires were paid 10/- per day.

Under the headline "Fieldsman Catches Rabbit" it was reported in the **Essendon Gazette** that there was a highlight in the match played on 11th October 1941 on the wicket at the Essendon Aerodrome between Australian National Airways and Essendon ANA. The reporter thought that this had never happened before during a cricket match. *"The ball was hit in the long grass to the leg side. An Essendon ANA player rushed to field the ball but to the dismay of his fellow fieldsmen he failed to return it. The reason was explained when he held aloft a full-grown rabbit. We have heard of fieldsmen taking birds on the wing but this is the first instance we have had under notice of a bunny committing suicide in this way."*

On 25th October 1941 J Turner playing for Australian National Airways against Carter Bros B scored a rapid 103 with nine sixes, five of which came from one over. Other highlights from matches on this date were McPherson (Australian National Airways) took 11/10 in total against Carter Bros "B"; C Johnstone (Keilor) took 13/22 in total against Flemington ANA including a hat trick and Clayton (Ormond Amateurs) took 6/48 in total against North Essendon including a hat trick.

On 22nd November 1941 a report was given in the **Essendon Gazette** of a match, which "staged one of the most exciting finishes ever seen in this Association. In the match Essendon ANA v Ormond Amateurs, ANA 31 behind on the first seemed doomed when Amateurs' score stood at four for 56. With seven wickets in hand and only wanting 15 to win it looked all over. However, ANA fought on, and with six to go 9 runs were wanted. A Knight, one of the older brigade took charge, and with the help of McKenzie the position changed to four to fall and 3 to win. When Knight went on to bowl what seemed to be the last over of the match, Ormond had two batsmen left and 1 run to win. With the dismissal of one with his second ball (one to fall – one to win) the situation was tense indeed. Two balls latter he dismissed the last man, thanks

to a beautiful catch by Lawry, and thus ended a most exciting match in which the last seven wickets fell for 15. Of these Knight took 6/13, the last four for 2 runs. Nice work Andy!"

Scores were Essendon ANA 53 & 101(Lawry 50, Furniss 7/59* Bond 4/26*) drew with Ormond Amateurs 84 (Nancarrow 28) & 70 (C Hickey 24, Nancarrow 21, Knight 11/73*, Love 5/21*) *These are total figures for the match.

On 29th November 1941 there was an interesting result, which demonstrates how some sides were ravaged by the loss of their players to the armed forces: Ormond Amateurs 5/76 d Flemington ANA 24 & 25 (K Furness 4/8). This result was achieved in less than one day and the match started at 2.15pm!

In November 1941 Carter Bros B and in January 1942 Australian National Airways were forced to withdraw their teams because of members joining the forces. Both teams were given "leave of absence" for the rest of the season hoping that perhaps next season would see the end of hostilities and the Association would be back to normal.

That man Knight was in the headlines again on 31st January 1942 taking a total of 12/81 in a match for Essendon ANA who defeated Carter Bros.

The semi finals were played between Oaklands and Ascot Vale (Umpires Trengrove and McDonald) and Ormond Amateurs and North Essendon (Umpires Tout and Nancarrow).

No scores are available for the semi finals.

Umpires Trengrove and Tout were appointed for the Grand Final but who were the teams???

Keilor won premiership

It appears that the Association went into recess after this season because of the war and did not reform again until 1947 but in another guise. I can find no record of when this occurred but possibly it happened after the Delegates Meeting of 19th May 1942.

On 5th September 1942 the Association President Cr F E Jolly was elected the 70th President of the Keilor Shire Council.

After the Association went into recess the remaining teams continued to struggle to field teams however I did find that on 6th November 1942 Ormond Amateurs played a match, at the West Brunswick turf wicket, against Essendon Stars. Unfortunately Ormond were soundly beaten by over an innings. Seems that they must have been without a lot of their star players or else it was a wet wicket.
